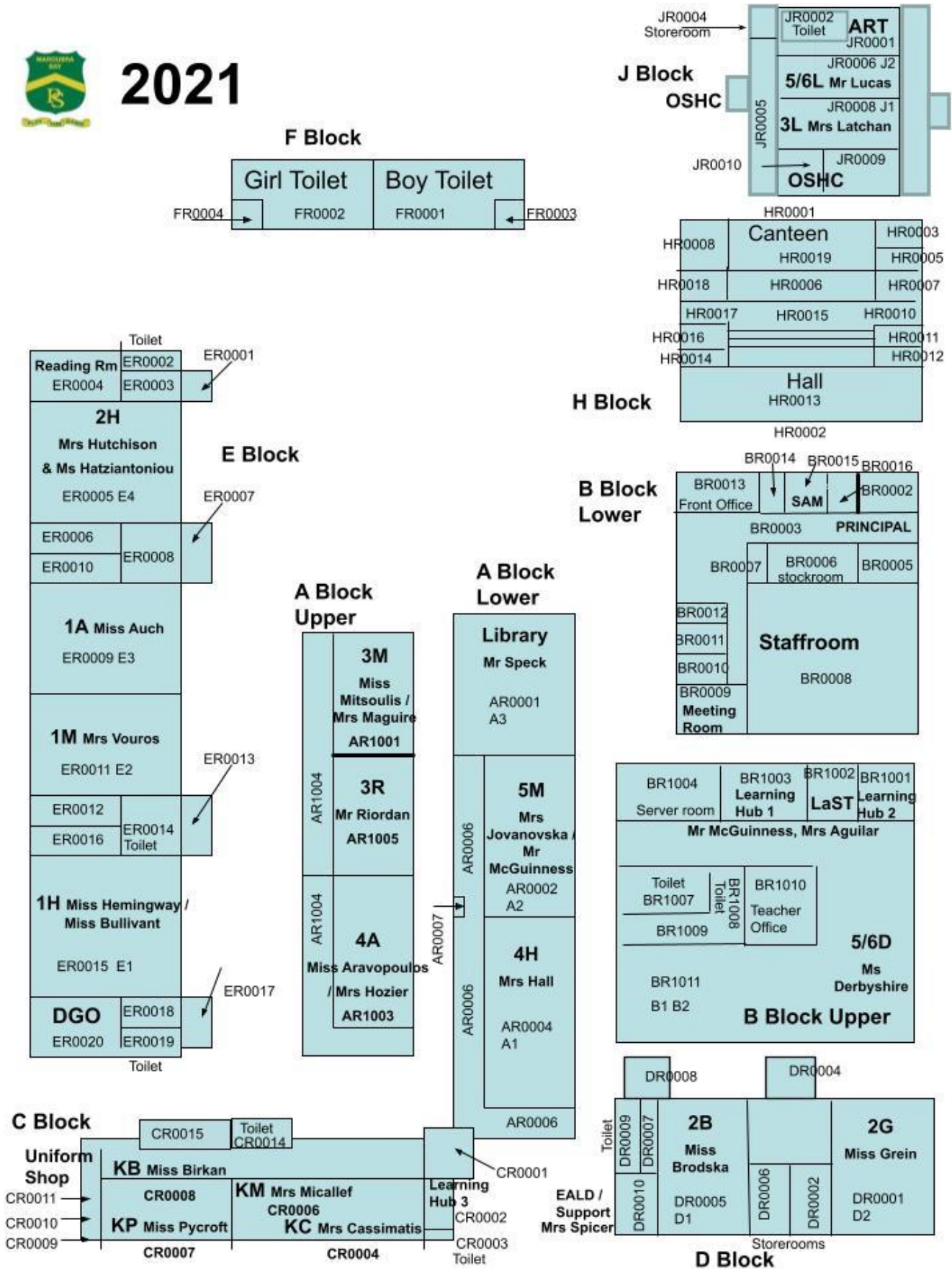

On the first day of school your child will be meeting their classmates, familiarising themselves with their classroom and all of the interesting things inside it, listening to stories, singing and dancing, talking about their likes and interests, and making new friends.

Library and Tech hub

Children visit the library once a week and may borrow a book upon the return of their previous week's loan. They will learn library skills and this is where a love of reading can be fostered. They can choose to borrow from a wide selection of books. Technology skills including coding and robotics are also taught during the weekly library session.

Home readers

As their reading skills improve in K-2, children are encouraged to borrow short story books from class to practise their reading at home. Home reader books should be swapped as often as daily and a special home reader folder will be provided.

Sport

All Classes participate in fitness activities during the week with 3-6 students also having the opportunity for PSSA and school sport on Fridays. Please check with your class teacher when your sports days are.



Assemblies

Students are acknowledged at regular assemblies throughout the year. Assemblies are held fortnightly for each section of our school, i.e. K-2 students in one week with 3-6 the following week. Parents are welcome to attend. Zoom sessions are also available for classes to keep assemblies running smoothly when health restrictions impact on cohorts mingling.

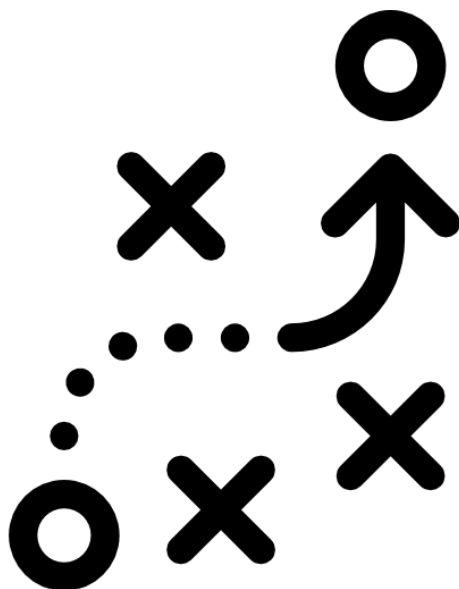
Strategic Direction 2 - Student , staff and community wellbeing

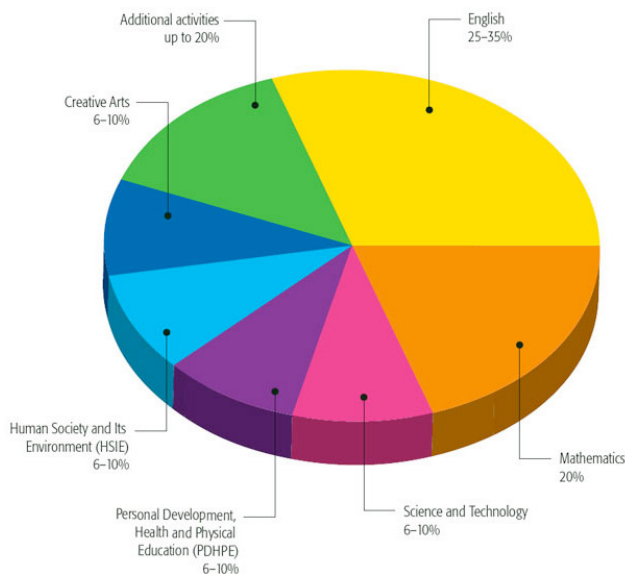

Learning and Support programs

Students have access to a variety of programs to support their learning at school. This includes;

- Tutor program** - a Department of Education Covid initiative to support students and lift educational outcomes. This small group program identifies students in need across Years 2,3,4 and 5 throughout the year.

- English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EAL/D)** program to support our learners that come from a language background other than English (LBOTE). EAL/D learners include Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander students who speak Aboriginal English or an Aboriginal language at home, students who were born in Australia or come from overseas as migrants, international students and students from refugee backgrounds. EAL/D learners may begin school in Australia at any age.

- School Counselling** - School counsellors utilise their psychological expertise to strengthen student wellbeing. They work collaboratively with school learning and support teams, parents and carers, and other agencies to enhance learning and wellbeing outcomes for students. School counsellors provide counselling and psychological assessment of students with specific needs. School counsellors are appointed to a base school and provide psychological counselling services to students in allocated public schools from Preschool to Year 12.

School counsellors:

- apply psychological expertise to support the social, emotional and educational development of students
- provide counselling using evidence-based interventions to improve the wellbeing of students
- undertake cognitive, emotional and behavioural assessments to develop appropriate school-based support for students
- work collaboratively with learning and support teams, parents and carers, and other agencies, to enhance learning and wellbeing outcomes for students.

At Maroubra Bay PS, our school counsellor Mr Guy Tate works each Tuesday. Parents are able to refer students to the counsellor using a referral form available from their child's class teacher.

Similarly, teachers can also refer students if concerned. The counsellor office is located in E block, closest to the top car park.

Homework



Each year group are asked to complete work at home that follows the work that students are doing in their classroom. As students get older, this homework becomes more formalised and has a greater emphasis.

Parents are asked to check the school's homework policy to see what each year is asked to complete. Parents have the option of not involving their child in homework, and are encouraged to discuss this with their child's class teacher.

Parents should consult the school procedures on homework, available on the school app and website for further information.

Special religious education (SRE) and special education in ethics (SEE)

Upon enrolment you will be asked if you wish your child to attend religious education classes. Currently we offer religious education for Catholics and Anglicans and these lessons run for 30 minutes on Tuesday mornings.

Maroubra Bay Public School also offers Ethics classes as an alternative to Special Religious Education during the same time slot. Ethics is a branch of philosophy that examines ethical concepts and issues, asking what is right or wrong in particular circumstances. Learning from home

When our school is closed or opening is restricted, the following systems will allow learning to continue.

All families should use the Class DoJo system for specific information on each class. This will include key messages from the class teacher.

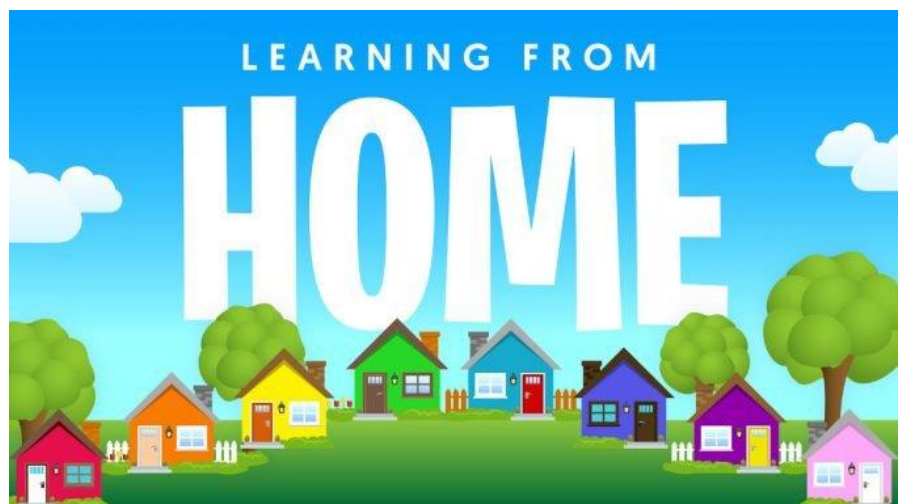
Students in Kindergarten and Year 1 and 2 will use [Class DoJo](#) as the basis of their learning from home. This will include learning grids, videos from teachers and interactive messages. Zoom sessions will also be available for students in K-2, with details provided in Class DoJo. Parents are allowed to use their own accounts for Zoom with younger students.

Students in Years 3-6 will be more independent in their learning, with a focus on Google Classroom. Students will be able to access their classroom through the student portal and complete all their required tasks through Google. Zoom sessions will also be available for students in Years 3-6, with details provided in the Google Classroom. Students in Years 3-6 must use Zoom through the Portal with their own student account.



The school also loans out devices (iPads for Kindergarten and Year 1, Chromebooks for Years 2-6) for any family that needs them to support student learning. Families are encouraged to contact the office through phone or email for further information.

Getting organised

How to get to school

There is no onsite parking, and limited parking on nearby streets. Directly out the front of the school is the 'Kiss and Go' drop off and pick up zone. All parents can use this service, however it is important that parents stay in their vehicle and students get in and out of the car by themselves.

There are also short term parking bays located outside the school on Duncan Street. If possible, it's easiest to walk to and from school.

What to bring

Students should bring recess and lunch, a water bottle and a school hat.

Students should also have a pencil case with essential items such as pencils, pens, glue sticks, rulers etc. Please don't include any nut products or items that have traces of nuts in your child's lunch. This includes peanut butter, Nutella and most muesli bars.

Each day your child will need:

- A water bottle
- A healthy snack for recess.
- Your child will be able to have a snack and some water during class time as part of 'Crunch n Sip' between 9am and 11am.
- A healthy lunch – no nut products or nut spreads. Make sure any packaged items are easy to open.

The school operates a Canteen from Wednesday to Friday with counter and online sales.

There's always a lot going on in your child's school, and we encourage you to be part of it all. That's why it's good to stay in touch. Here are a few ways to do that:

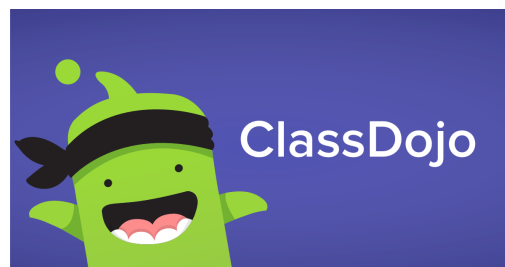

Teacher contact

If you'd like to arrange a face to face meeting with your child's teacher about anything at all, please ask the school office for an appointment. It's usually possible to organise a quick meeting at fairly short notice, either before or after school.

Sometimes teachers are comfortable sharing their work email address to parents for school related information, however parents can always use the school email below if they do not have their direct teacher address.

Fees and contributions

As a public school, Maroubra Bay has no compulsory fees. However, government funding is limited so we ask families to pay a voluntary contribution fund. This is determined at the beginning of the school year, and can be paid in one sum or as regular payments. You will receive a receipt for any contribution made.

Extra-curricular activities, such as excursions, music and performance programs, typically involve a cost to families. We do try to keep this to a minimum. If you have any concerns, you are welcome to contact the school office at any time.

We encourage parents to use our payments online portal (POP) for all payments to the school. This is easy to use through the school website.

Absences and holidays

If your child is unwell, home is the best place to be. It's important for all members of our school community that we try to reduce the risk of passing on infections, and we have limited space to care for sick children at school. If your child is ill at school, the office staff will call you to request that you collect and take him/her home.

It is essential that you send a sick note for the teacher when your child returns to school, explaining the reason for the absence. Parents and carers can do this through the Skoolbag app, emailing or phoning the school. If your child is late to school, or needs to leave school early, please visit the school office to get a late note (or leave note) for the class teacher.

In accordance with Department of Education policy, you must request a Certificate of Leave or a Certificate of Exemption from the Principal if you intend to take your child away from the school during term time for any reason other than illness. This is usually for periods of 10 school days or more being missed. This is at the Principal's discretion and there are strict policy guidelines in place that mean the leave may not be granted. Every day of learning is important, and we encourage families to take their holidays during school holiday time.

Staff development days

There are five student-free days during the school year, usually adjacent to the school holidays. These days enable all members of staff to participate in professional learning and program development.

Usually the first 2 occur before students return back to school in term 1. There is also a staff development day before students return in terms 2 and 3. The last day is at the end of the school year after students have finished for the year.

School Assessment and Student Reports

You will receive a student progress report at the end of Term 2, and an end of year report at the end of Term 4. Your child will be assessed on an ongoing basis during class time.

Parent teacher interviews are held during Term 1 or Term 2 to ensure we catch any potential problems early in the year. You are welcome to request a follow up parent teacher interview at any time during the year.

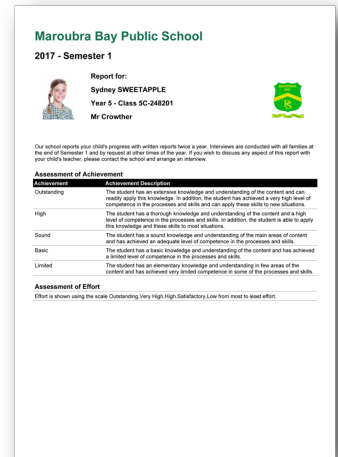
Additional external student assessments also include:

- National assessments (NAPLAN) for year 3 and 5 students

If your child has any learning difficulties, or is learning English as a Second Language, their report will be written by the specialist teacher.
